A Brewster Homestead in Ohio

The Descendants of Elder William Brewster and his wife Mary fill two thick volumes of the "Brewster Genealogy" 1566-1907 compiled by Emma C. Jones in 1908. It has

since been republished by Forgotten Books, (www.ForgottenBooks.com). My branch of the family descends from William and Mary's son, Jonathan, then Benjamin and on toward my generation through all men until my great grandmother, Emma Jeanette Brewster Ross. Our branch moved from Plimoth Plantation to Connecticut, to Vermont, and into Ohio in the early 1800's.

My great grandmother Emma Brewster's grandfather is recorded variously as Johnston, Jonathan, and Johnson. Born in Tinmouth, VT in 1780, he moved to Ohio in 1802. In 1812 he married Catherine Reise, the same year this stone farmhouse was completed, according to the date on the apex of the home. It was built from stones hauled by wagon from a nearby quarry and is located in Salt Creek Township, on Chandlersville Road (Route 146), a few miles southeast of Zanesville. Johnston and Catherine are buried at a cemetery in nearby Duncan Falls.

One of their sons, Ozem, born in 1825 is credited with being one of the first native Muskingum pioneers. Another of their sons, Stephen Brewster, is our link to the Mayflower Brewsters. He and his wife Elizabeth Brown has six children, four sons and a set of twin girls. One of the twins was Emma, my great-grandmother. Stephen and several others of his family are also buried in the Duncan Falls Cemetery, including Emma and her husband, Smiley Hugh Ross.

Kevin and Deborah Deal live next to what was the Brewster farm. John T. Deal purchased the farm in 1891. The house was inherited by his daughter, Alice upon his death and the land by his son, Silvers R. Deal. Alice sold the house and moved to Zanesville about 1940. It was always Silver's

dream to have the house back in the family. This was accomplished in 1965. Deborah believes Ozem and his family were the last Brewsters to occupy the home. The Deal family have lived in the house off and on through the decades. Lance Deal, Deborah's son is considering remodeling the house as a family guest house. Deborah has an old photo of a church picnic along the lane bordering the property, which shows up on a map as Brewster's Lane.

I am most grateful to Deborah for her help researching the history of this former Brewster home. She is co-director of the Genealogical Research Institute of Pittsburg, PA, an organization dedicate to providing in-depth genealogical education. She say that as a farm wife, married to a man whose family has been farming the same land since 1830, she understands the importance of preserving the heritage of the land and it's people.

My mother (Elizabeth Jeanette Ross Hieber) was equally dedicated to preserving our family's Brewster history. Her detailed research into our family's connections to Elder William Brewster prompted me to write Mayflower Chronicle: The Tail of Two Cultures, released in 2020. My new historical fiction biography of the Elder's les well-known wife Mary was published by Van Velzer Press in March 2023. Mary Brewster's Love Life: Matriarch of the Mayflower, recounts the first seven years in a new settlement. She was one of four women still alive the following fall. Both books are available in print and eBook through my website:

<u>www.HowWiseThen.com</u> or wherever books are sold as well as in numerous libraries Those these books are not genealogical resources; they do accurately follow the trail from Scrooby to Leiden to Plimoth. I wrote them as fiction so I could have people talking to one another and sharing their reactions to the remarkable adventures they had.



The following article comes from a book given to the society many years ago called: *English Thread in American Homespun:* Page 3-5

THE LITTLE ICE AGE

"Climatologists call the period around 1400 until 1850 the "Little Ice Age" when much of the Northern Hemisphere was in the grip of significantly colder weather than we have now. From 1645 until 1715, when it was it's coldest, the River Thames in England froze over on its surface. By 1815 the weather had warmed, and the Thames stopped freezing.

Wrestling Brewster and his family lived their entire lives during this colder period, frequently in winter having their house buried in snow to it's roofline, as is recorded in some Plymouth Colony villages.

As a builder of houses, Wrestling would have been aware of the need for tight, sturdy construction, ample fireplaces and nearby out-buildings. Bundles of hay stacked against exterior walls would be substitutes for today's wall insulation. Was I in the attic too?

Wrestling's houses had no running water, indoor plumbing or bathtubs. Can we imagine the discomfort and danger of a trip to the outhouse? Or to feed and bed down the oxen, cow and hogs. No wonder the first in the fireplace never as permitted to die. Yet, in winter heavy loads could be moved over ice and snow, and travel by sleigh was not limited as by the muddy and dusty paths of summer.

FROM THE BREWSTER BOOK

The following is an entry that was transcribed from the "Brewster Book" which was transcribed by Caleb Johnson for the 400th anniversary of the landing of the Pilgrims. This article is from page 93 of this book.

"This entry was made by Daniel Brewster, The "Great Snow" of February 1717 is considered one of the biggest snowstorms to have ever hit New England. Cotton Mather wrote his own account of it: "One the twentieth of the last February there came on a snow, which being added unto what had covered the ground a few days before, made a thicker mantle for our Mother than what was usual: And ye storm with it was for the following day, so violent as to make all communication between ye neighbors every where to cease.... The Indians near a hundred years old, affirm that their fathers never told them of anything that equaled it. Vast numbers of

Cattel were destroyed in this Calamity. Whereof some there were.... Found standing dead on their legs, as if they had been alive many weeks after... One gentleman, on whose farms were now lost above 1100 sheep, which with other Cattel, were interred..in the Snow, writes me word that there were two sheep..found alive, which had been there all this time, and kept themselves alive by eating the wood of their dead companions.... A man had a couple of young Hoggs, which he gave over for dead. But on the twenty seventh day after their burial, they made their way out of a snowbank as the botto of which they had found a little Tansy to feed upon.... A vast multitude of Deer, for ye same cause, taking yt the same course. And ye Deep snow spoiling them of their only Defense, which is to run, they became such a prey to those Devourers, that it is thought not one in twenty escaped... It is incredible how much damage is done to ye orchards. For the Snow freezing to a crust, as high as the boughs of ye orchards. For the snow freezing to a crust, as high as the bough of ye trees... the Cattle also walking on ye crusted snow a dozen foot from ye ground, so fed upon ye Trees as very much to damnify them."
